Ranch Tours!

Bengard Ranch -Salinas – The Bengard family started out as true pioneers in the Salinas Valley. In 1855, James Bardin traveled across the Great Plains to California in a covered wagon, searching for rich farming and grazing land. Wes Eade also made his way to California in the 1800's to farm and raise cattle. This heritage led the way for Tom and Terry Bengard, the grandchildren of James Bardin and Wes Eade, to establish the Tom Bengard Ranch in the 1960's. Tom started farming sugar beets, small white beans, potatoes and spring lettuce

on the original home ranch. As the business continue to grow, Tom transitioned into row crops. Tom managed the crops, Terry managed the bookkeeping and together successfully built the ranch to what it is today. The next steps involved packing and shipping with their own label which they started in the 1970's. Today, the Bengard Ranch is one of the largest grower-shippers in the Western United States, farming in California and Arizona with extensive operations in Mexico and Florida. Bengard Ranch also have black angus cattle and grazes them throughout the state on 17 different ranches.

Hahn Winery – Soledad – Spanish missionaries recognized the rare soils and favorable climate of the Santa Lucia Highlands of Monterey and planted grapevines there. When the founder Nicholas (Nicky) Hahn and his wife Gaby first purchased land in the Highlands, cattle, sheep and horses ranged over the hills. Vineyards were a secondary concern. It didn't take Nicky long to see the land he purchased as a destination for more than feeding animals. In 1980, the Hahn released their first wine from SLH. It was eight years later, in 1991 Nicky led the charge to establish SLH as an American Viticulture area. Today, Hahn Family Wines, is now run by Nicky and Gaby's son Philip, who owns and sustainably farms 650 acres of estate vineyards in the Santa Lucia Highlands.

Garlinger Cattle Ranch – Salinas – Garlinger Cattle Ranch was established in 1880 by Del Garlinger's grandfather, Hans Hansen, and Garlinger Cattle Ranch is still in operation as a fourth generation cattle ranch. The matriarch, Pat at 93 years old is still involved in the operation. The ranch is located in the Salinas Valley in the Gabilian Mountains, and is managed by five sisters and their mother. The family also grows and leases farmland for crops including lettuce, broccoli, strawberries, peas, bok choy and more.

The Monterey Shuttle runs from both the San Francisco International Airport and the San Jose International Airport. The shuttle runs every hour to hour and a half. It is very reasonable priced at \$35 online discount rate, \$40 not online rate from Monterey to San Jose. It is \$45 online discount rate, \$50 not online rate from Monterey to San Francisco. If you plan to rent a car and drive over, plan on at least 1 ½ hours minimum if you are coming in during the afternoon to drive over from San Jose or San Francisco.

San Francisco Airport - Domestic (Terminals 1-3): Cross the street from the lower level baggage claim to the blue posts on the center islands labeled "Airporters."

San Jose Airport- Domestic (Terminal B): Across the street from the baggage claim to the ground transportation island shelter labeled "Scheduled Buses." Bus stop #6.
