American National CattleWomen Vice President 2013

Sometimes it is "out of the frying pan and into the fire." However, to put the last six months in a positive perspective this is what I must tell myself daily, "Change is inevitable; growth is optional." In February, Tampa, Florida, I had the opportunity to interview for ANCW Vice President posistion which ultimately led to my election, a step that has been challenging and at times a bit overwhelming.

Looking back at the list of past ANCW Presidents, I see the names of only two: Marion Guthrie, Tulare, 1954, and Florence Giorgi, Santa Barbara 1971. With your support and love, I will move on to President Elect next February and ultimately ANCW President in San Antonio, Texas, in 2015.

Before committing to this office, I had applied to be a member of the ANCW Beef Speaker's Bureau. When accepted, in late February I undertook extensive training with 12 other ladies in Denver. I committed to five presentations as I didn't want to feel pressured. Today I have completed 41 presentations to 1107 folks in California and Southern Oregon: Rotarians, Kiwanians, Lion's, Junior League children, Etna and Yreka High students, Samuel Kennedy Elementary 5th graders in Sacramento, and CA State Fairgoers. I used a power point entitled, "Beef: a Healthy Choice" in the classrooms, and with four other Siskiyou ladies the MBA wheel at State Fair.

Right before Tampa, ANCW President Barbara Jackson asked Beth Anderson, Utah, Gwen Geis, Wyoming, and me to design an ANCW and State form to encourage membership and participation. It is now known as the WIGGY(Wildly Import Goals, Go Yahoo!) and is designed to create some specific marketing activities that will reach out and engage more cattlewomen. It's set up to provide friendly competition among states in the region and then among regions. Some of the components include 1% increase in state and ANCW membership, minimum of 20 adult and youth presentations, etc. Of course California submitted a contract; in fact all of Region VI except for Hawaii, did so. The grand prize is a Powder River calf chute, something I was able to negotiate with Powder River reps.

ANCW Executive Committee training was four days the second week in March. Three of these days were spent with ANCW Director Sarah Bohnenkamp presenting Franklin Covey's 7 HABITS OF HIGHLY EFFECTIVE PEOPLE and the last day we planned the coming year, an intense commitment.

As Vice President, my major assignment was the ANCW Silent Auction at the July Summer Convention in Denver. California, you gave me such support. These folks contributed items to the auction: Karen Moller, Tammie McElroy, Millie Krause, Sheila Bowen, Rebecca Been, former student and Giants Board Member Rob Dean, and California CattleWomen. Then there were my faithful troopers who set up and stayed with the booth: Jean Barton, Karen Sweet, Tammie McElroy, Debbie Torres, Sheila and Alicia Bowen. Co-ordinating this endeavor with ladies across the U.S. was a learning experience in itself.

In June ANCW President Barbara Jackson and I traveled to Wooster, Ohio, to reinvigorate cattlewomen in Region I. We met at the Certified Angus Beef headquarters, where we participated in a number of educational presentations, and then followed up with ANCW committee work. Since Barbara could not attend the Oregon CattleWomen meeting in Baker City, OR, I went in her place and presented at their meeting.

In closing, I encourage you to join ANCW. If you don't have time to work in the ANCW CattleWomen booth at the Metropolitan Food Show in D.C. or the energy to represent cattlewomen in a store beef promotion, you could at least do some ANCW guided tweets, FB, or utilize some of the other social media tools to communicate with the consumer. Yes, "Change is inevitable" – growth is your choice.

CALIFORNIA CATTLEWOMEN: A Golden Opportunity

It is hard to believe it has been almost a year since I began my presidency. I have been blessed with an outstanding set of officers and committee chairs. As a team we have accomplished some great things, one being that we have tried to stay to our budget and several of the ladies have stepped up and we have had some great meetings with lots of information. Our membership for the year has been a little short this year from the previous year with 1804 members as of our June meeting.

My year began with trying to increase membership, so I started a membership contest for the Top Cowgirl Buckle for the member who has brought in the most CCW members and a buckle for the member who has brought in the most ANCW members. I also included a buckle for the number of activity reports sent in. Membership is important with any organization as it shows unity; remember the old saying 'there are safety in numbers'.

I also took the booth to California Rangeland Summit in Davis this year. Because the summit ran during the Red Bluff Bull Sale it was hard to get anyone to help but I had a booth with our information on it for the 2 day meetings. I had the opportunity to meet with a lot of new people as well as touch base with friends.

Again this year we attended the World Ag Expo in Tulare where our booth was once again well received. The Kern County CattleWomen did a great job on putting together a great booth. We again had our wheel of knowledge and engaged about 2000 people in dialogue regarding beef. Our prizes this year were a copy of the Ranch History Book. This event is well attended and it was estimated to be just over 100,000 people there this year from 70 different countries.

I was unable to attend the Legislative Breakfast and Ag Day at the Capital this year due to a surgery, but the California CattleWomen was well represented. We again served tri tip sandwiches and had the opportunity to interact with the public on the beef story.

The spring meeting held in March was a large success, our Beef Promotion Chair; Susan Cochrane did an outstanding meeting with guest speakers such as Jeff Fowle, Janel Fisher from the Beef Council and several cattlewomen. She had cattlewomen share their beef promo successes. It is great that we have so many talented women in the state that we do not have to pay for speakers. The midyear meeting also went well, we were able to meet with our accountant and learn more about the way the Heritage Foundation should work.

We had a successful Beef Ambassador Contest with contestants going to Arkansas this year to compete for a place on the team. This year we had a booth at the California State Fair during

when the cattle were showing. This was a new opportunity but it was important for us to be there do to the fact that P.E.T.A. had a booth at the fair. I had the honor of working a couple days at the booth and had several people thank me for being there because they had seen the P.E.T.A. booth. The San Joaquin/Stanislaus group got the booth together and did a magnificent job.

As I have stated some many other times I am so honored to have been chosen to represent this great group of ladies not only here in California but at ANCW meetings. We are fortunate in California that we have 6 ladies representing us; Melanie Fowle – ANCW Vice President, Jean Barton – newsletter, Rebecca Been – Co Chair Ag Education and Curriculum, Debbie Torres – Education and Curriculum, Sheila Bowen – membership and myself as our state delegate and Chair of By-Laws, Policies and Procedures, and Resolutions. Remember your membership help these ladies show the rest of ANCW how engaged and knowledgeable the California CattleWomen are.





California Beef Ambassador Program

The objective of the National Beef Ambassador Program is to provide an opportunity for youth to educate consumers and students about beef nutrition, food safety, and stewardship practices of the beef industry. Beef Ambassadors serve as wonderful advocates for the beef industry at the local, state and national levels. The California CattleWomen and California Beef Council team up to sponsor a state contest each spring.

The 2013 California Beef Ambassador Contest was held on Saturday, April 27th at Chico State. Twenty four contestants competed; twelve in the senior division, and twelve in the junior division. Legislative Report

To follow is a brief update of the bills that are currently being worked on and followed by the California Cattlemens Association. This very brief list is the most current of those tracked with the most up to date information. Please keep in mind that some may be actually voted on at submission of this report so it is possible things may change. Providing the best information is very important to me so I have asked Justin Oldfield from California Cattlemen to assist with the update. Since CCW mirrors CCA I felt it was best to work together in providing all of you the most accurate information.

SB 25 (Steinberg) – Farm Labor Contracts *CCA Opposed

Currently, mandatory mediation involving a third party negotiator may be requested by either the recognized union or the employer if voluntary collective bargaining cannot be reached. This bill would allow mandatory mediation to occur for labor contract renewals as well and virtually require a union to do little work to represent the wishes of their constituents.

Passed Senate & Assembly, Enrolled for Governor's Signature or Veto

AB 924 (Bigelow) - Livestock Theft *CCA Sponsored

This bill increases penalties for livestock theft by allowing a court to impose a fine of up to \$5,000 per incident to be paid to the Bureau of Livestock Identification. This bill increases the allowable fine for a conviction that is plead as a misdemeanor and generally is higher than fines currently assessed for felony convictions. Currently, fines are distributed to local jurisdictions and the state general fund and are not recovered as additional resources to prevent future livestock theft.

Passed Assembly & Senate, Enrolled for Governor's Signature or Veto

AB 976 (Atkins) – California Coastal Commission *CCA Opposed

Current law requires the California Coastal Commission when seeking an enforcement action, including the levy of fines, to be done through the district attorney's office for a violation of a regulation adopted pursuant to the California Coastal Act. This bill would allow the California Coastal Commission to directly initiate fines or an enforcement action against an individual or business with a simple majority vote of the board.

Passed Assembly, Waiting Senate Floor Vote

AB 1213 (Bloom) - Bobcat Protection Act *CCA Opposed

This bill makes it illegal to trap bobcats on public and private lands. This bill also makes it a crime for any individual to offer a bobcat for sale; historically done for the sale of fur. Limited provisions have been granted under the bill to provide depredation permits for the protection of livestock and private property. Data presented by the Department of Fish and Wildlife provides no indication that bobcats are endangered and the data actually demonstrates a thriving and healthy bobcat population statewide.

Passed Assembly, Waiting Senate Floor Vote

SB 53 (De Leon), SB 374 (Steinberg), SB 396 (Hancock) - Life-saving Intelligent Firearms Enforcement (LIFE) Act *CCA Neutral (Working with NRA, other gun organizations and CCA members directly to rally staunch opposition)


SB 53 – Bans online purchases of ammunition and requires all transactions for purchasing ammunition to be conducted through a licensed dealer. Beginning July 1, 2015, all persons purchasing ammunition will need to apply for a permit from the Department of Justice. A list will be compiled recognizing approved purchasers by driver's license number. All transactions must first consult this list to ensure purchasers are approved.

SB 374 – Redefines an assault weapon as any center-fire semiautomatic rifle that will accept a detachable magazine regardless of the features or characteristics of the rifle (pistol grip, telescoping stock, flash suppressor, etc.) Requires any assault weapon legally owned to be registered with the Department of Justice and bans future sale or transfer of assault weapons in California.

SB 396 – Requires anyone legally possessing a magazine with the capacity to accept more than 10 rounds to 1) destroy the magazine, 2) surrender it to law enforcement, 3) sell it a registered dealer or 4) sell the magazine to an out-of-state resident.

Passed Senate, Waiting Assembly Floor Vote (All Bills)





Ag in the Classroom: We participate in Butte County Farm City Celebration. We do a "Create a Cow project. Third grade teachers have a choice of doing a poster or creating a cow from a wooden frame (a saw horse with a board for a head attached). Each Teacher is given a folder with information on By Products, Branding, Nutrition and other livestock information. The "Cows and or Posters", were judged by Butte County CattleWomen and monetary awards are given. By participating in the "Create A Cow" project the teacher is entitled to bring her class to "Kids Day at the Farm". At "Kids Day at the Farm, BCCW do 10 to 16 presentations on Beef By Products and also have a center to show livestock items such as saddles, branding equipment, ropes, etc. The children have the opportunity to sit on the saddles and rope a dummy steer head. The Calaveras/Tuolumne Cattlewomen have had an eventful year and it's still evolving. The most pressing is the Rim Fire that has burned in excess of 237,000 acres as I write this report. Many Cattlemen and Cattlewomen were affected and sustained losses. At this point, it is still not known how many cattle were overcome by the fire but we know it's in the hundreds. We've heard about groups of 20-30 cows in an area all dead; tallied by desperate ranchers looking for their cattle. One rancher has stated he lost at least 200 head. Needless to say many allotments were also destroyed which means no place for the surviving cattle next year. When adding up the costs of lost barns, fences, cattle and feed the estimate quickly reaches into the millions of dollars. It has been officially determined that a careless hunter allowed an illegal fire to escape causing one of the largest fires in our state.

As far as our scheduled events are concerned they have all gone off without any hitches. We chose a Cowbelle of the Year, Ms. Valerie Gurney. She enjoyed being honored at Convention. Eleven of us went to support her and partake in the festivities. We were lucky too having been drawn for four baskets at the Cowbelle Luncheon. That's a record for us.

We've continued our tradition of giving out \$500 scholarships to students who will make a difference in the Ag world in the future.

County Fairs in both counties were well attended and our booths were award winning again.

• Scholarship

Thanks to our Taste of Beef Sip of Wine event and generous donations, scholarship monies increased in FY13 allowing us to give out a total of \$5500.00 to 7 deserving students. \$2200.00 went to Ag Scholarships and \$3300.00 went to Memorial Scholarships. The recipients are furthering their education in areas such as: Ag Business, Business Management/Marketing, Ag Education, Ag Communications and Illustration.

Ag in the Classroom

- o <u>Third Grade History Day</u>: This event is held to provide third graders with the opportunity to experience some of the history of Lassen County. Our contribution enabled 200 students to actually use a rope to lasso a roping dummy as well as learn a little about why ranchers use ropes to catch cattle. A by-products display also allowed children and adults to better understand how cattle contribute to our everyday life. Students received sour licorice candy, beef pencils, and beef brochures.
- O Mother's Day Recipe Contest: 3rd graders are invited to write a story about their favorite beef recipe and how it is prepared for them at home. This is a fun contest, especially for the members who judge the creative and often imaginative essays! Two schools participated and for the first time, the winning student and teacher where mother and daughter. Our winner received a certificate of recognition, a \$15 gift certificate for

Beef Promotion

- O CowaBunga Contest: This contest is the lead-in into our Taste of Beef/Sip of Wine Event. The LCCW Ladies create new appetizers with approximately 25 people competing. We select the Top 3 Winners and present awards. The Top 3 Winning Appetizers go into our Recipe Book and they are show-cased at the Event.
- O Taste of Beef / Sip of Wine Event: The Event is held the 1st Friday of February each year. We served approximately 300 people. As this year was the 25th Anniversary of our event, we went all out. Silver balloons and rope vases made by one of our members adorned the tables. The local brewery added their special brews to the event delighting the non-wine drinkers. Our ladies prepared and presented approximately 15 favorite appetizers all showcasing various cuts of beef. Local businesses and Members donated 35 items which were presented for the silent auction. From mugs featuring our LCCW logo and Lassen County Brands paired with Cowboy Roast Coffee to wine, jewelry, rope vases with fresh western-style bouquets, handmade meat/turner BBQ forks, artwork and overnight stays, bidders had a wide variety to choose from. Additionally, a local gun shop donated a Winchester SX3 compact 20 Gauge shotgun to help celebrate the 25th Annivesary. Over all the silent auction and gun raffle brought in \$3700 and we netted over \$6,000.00 for the total wine tasting. A very successful event given our attendance was lower due to the economy.
- O Rails to Trails Festival and Chili Cook-Off Event: The Lassen County CattleWomen competed for the second time in this annual event. This year's scrumptious beef chili featured smoked beef brisket and locally grown chilies to give our "Pistol Pack'n, Rib Stick'n, Better than Chick'n, BEEF Chili new twist. Many people stopped at our booth to fill out raffle tickets for a chance to win beef gift certificates to our local grocery store. This fun filled event provides a great promotion opportunity for us. Approximately 1100 people attended.
- o <u>Father's Day Beef Promotion</u>: This annual contest awards a \$25 beef gift certificate to purchase beef at local grocery stores to the baby's father that is born on or nearest to Father's Day at our local hospital. This year, our award actually went to a very grateful mother who is temporarily playing the role of both mother and father to the new baby and her older brother. We also sponsored a Beef Trivia contest on Radio for a 25\$ beef gift certificate.

Day at the Diamond Mountain Speedway: This new venture in beef promotion was prompted by one of our members whose husband participated at the Diamond Mountain Speedway races throughout the summer. With our logo racing around the track and "Beef, Its What's for Dinner" announced every time our own "Ricky Bobby" got recognition, the Lassen County CattleWomen reached a new audience. Beef gift certificates, insulated cooler bags and LCCW logoed beer cozies were given out to lucky ticket holders. In addition to race days, our local radio station promoted our organization when promoting the races. Approximately 3,735 people attended the races throughout the season.

• County Fair Activities

- o *Fair Booth:* This year's theme was "Stars and Stripes and Fair Delights". Our booth took first place in the adult category.
- O <u>Red Barn</u>: The Lassen County Fair booth features beef and our industry. The booth is centered around our "Red Barn" trailer on wheels. New this year was the "Beef Wheel of Facts" which was a huge success with correct answers winning a sample of beef jerky. Thursday evening, our current Beef Ambassador served grilled ground beef tidbits to passersby who thoroughly enjoy this treat. Each day, people sign up to win one of three \$50 beef gift certificates and one of three "Healthy Beef Cookbooks". Recipes, bumper stickers, kids' activity books are available to pick up. Approximately 300 tickets were filled out for the prizes.
- <u>Kiddies Ag Day:</u> Kiddies Ag Day enables children to learn and experience agriculture activities. The Lassen County CattleWomen are heavily involved in this event. Approximately 150 children participated ranging from Pre-school through 7th grade. We hosted 6 stations: face painting; farm animal, Beefman and I Love Farmers tattoos, steer roping, a by-products table (complete with a hide for kids to brush and touch), patriotic duck ring toss and branding (children creating their own brands using water soluble markers and velcroing them to a felt covered steer). Each participant received a beef jerky treat and red, white & blue gummy treats with beef fact stickers on the label.
- Best Beef Carcass: Following the Auction from the Fair, we recognize the top 3
 students who have the best beef carcass by awarding each with a check. In the end, this
 is really what it is all about: the beef product. Pictures are taken and shared in the
 Lassen Times Newspaper

Other

- Radio Ag Report: This year, we were invited to participate in our local radio Ag Report (JDX Radio Station). The Ag Report airs weekly and we rotate amongst the many agriculture organizations across Lassen County in writing and presenting the Ag Report. The Lassen County CattleWomen sponsored two Ag Reports since it began this past July. The Ag Report reaches approximately 75,000 listeners spanning the multiple counties that KSUE/JDX reaches.
- o **Food for Families:** We donated cash for the purchase of beef food items to the Lassen County District Attorney's Victims Assistance Program, during the winter holidays.

- Lassen County Favorite Foods Day: The Lassen County 4-H Youth Program put on the first 4-H Favorite Foods Day this year. The purpose of this event is to give 4-H members a chance to exhibit a favorite food, plan a balanced menu around the food and develop an appreciation of the relationship between good health and good nutrition. The Lassen County CattleWomen sponsored the Theme Food: Beef category. Five 4-H members prepared beef recipes: Dylann's Famous Tri-Tip, Hobo Dinner, Empanadas, Swedish Meatballs and Stuffed Mushrooms. Those competing in the "Beef" category were awarded prizes totaling \$100. A total of 90 4-Hers and their parents were present for this event.
- o **Sober Graduation:** Approximately 300 students participated in the Sober Grad Night and the Lassen County CattleWomen donated \$50 as a prize donation.
- **Summary:** In total, our beef promotion and Ag in the Classroom reached approximately 5,566 plus fair attendance and radio and newspaper reach.

2012 –2013 Round-Up Report

The 2012-13 year has flown by for the Modoc County Cattlewomen. We began the year with a change in the officers. With the stepping down of Deb Cockrell as president big shoes were left to President Missy Davies. However, she has an outstanding young officer team to keep up the energy of the past two years- Nicole Hinton, 1st Vice President; Deb Nelson, 2nd Vice President; Gina Nelson, Secretary; and Wanda Rhoades, Treasurer. We also have three Directors- Linda Nelson, Cassie Oaryzun, and Freida DuBois.

The new year for MCCW begins in the Fall, with the Fall meeting, induction of officers, and the announcement of the Cattlewoman of the Year. This year's recipient of the award was Deb Nelson. Deb has been the Scrapbook chairmen for many years, has done Cards for the Troops, the Fall Feeder Sale, and is always willing to lend a hand in a bind. She is an outstanding member of the Association.

We had our annual silent auction fundraiser in conjunction with the Modoc County Cattlemen's Association, this event was chaired by Diane Zimmerman and Sharon Crabtree. This day turn out to be extremely busy as we took on a new event- the Fall Festival held the same day. Our unit holds eleven luncheon meetings per year, excluding the month of December. Our meeting in November is our Annual Auction/Luncheon at which time we draw the names of our scholarship brand quilt and lap quilt winners. Each year, entrants wait with "bated breath" hoping that they will be the winner of one of our beautiful handmade quilts!

<u>Scholarship</u>- The total monies received throughout the year from the sale of our brand quilt tickets goes into our Scholarship Fund. This year we had four <u>new</u> scholarship recipients that were awarded \$1,000.00 each and three <u>returning</u> scholarship recipients that were awarded \$500.00 each. Each of the scholarship recipients were so deserving of their award!

<u>Beef Promotion</u>-Our unit participated in the Yuba Pass Chili Cook Off and served a beef based chili as well as handed out beef related brochures. We held our "B.E.E.F." (Best Ever Educator Forever) essay contest for 4th, 5th, and 6th graders again this year. Packets were sent to all the elementary schools in our counties. Students were to write in 150 words or less why they thought their current teacher, or a teacher in the past, was the "B.E.E.F". The two winning teachers each received \$100.00 for classroom supplies and the two winning students each received \$25.00. We set up a booth and sold items as well as handed out beef related brochures and recipes at the following events: Cowboy Poetry, Rotary 4th of July Picnic, Calpine Marketplace, Nervino Fly-In, and the Historical Society. A local grocery store places beef related brochures in each customers bag and at each of our monthly meetings we hand out a beef recipe.

<u>Fundraisers</u>- This year we held two fundraiser dinners: a Beef Enchilada buffet style dinner in the fall; and, a Beef Bourguignon sit down dinner in the spring. Both were very very successful!

Ag In The Classroom- Our ladies went above and beyond the call of duty this year to bring a wealth of information into the classrooms in our counties! Many hours of reading took place in a variety of grade levels and schools. Our co-chair dressed up as Annie Oakley and gave a short history of "Annie's" life, read a book and had props that related to the story. We have taught about the following: nutrients in beef, cooked a variety of beef dishes, beef and beef by-products, ruminants, breeds of cattle, dairy cows and dairy products, as well as taught students how to make butter. We did a lesson on, "Is Earth The Apple of Your Eye?", to demonstrate the small amount of earth which we can use to plant crops. In November, we participated in Apple Day at one of the local high schools and taught students how to do the following: make apple cider, apple head dolls, applesauce; and, canning crabapples. At a variety of elementary schools we showed the video of "Life On A Cattle Ranch" and then had the students rotate through stations pertaining to ZIP, beef by-products, brands, vocabulary, and what cattle eat. Each teacher received a "Guide to Ranch Life", activity brochures and pencils for their students. We did an Earth Day presentation on the Water Cycle and made water cycle bracelets with different colored beads to represent the parts of the water cycle. At "Pioneer Living History Days", a three day event in Quincy, we taught local students how to make beef jerky and why it was made by the pioneers. Our "Ranch Day", for third and fourth graders, has been held at the ranch of Dave and Doris Goss for the passed 36 years. Along with their help, that of our cattlewomen, and a few of our husbands, the students rotate through six stations: history of ranch/wagon ride; beef cattle care; beef by-products; branding; sheep and sheep dog demonstration; and, the chicken/egg cycle. Dave and Doris's generosity has made it possible for many students to participate in such a wonderful "first-hand experience"!

Fair- The theme this year was "Fun, Family, and Friends", and we set up our booth accordingly. We had a "Name That Tool" contest (old farm tools, etc.), which brought about much interest and discussion; displayed our scholarship brand quilts; had a "Kids' Korral"; sold beef promotional items; handed out beef related brochures and recipes; and, served tri-tip samples every evening. We helped set up and serve approximately 160-165 tri-tip dinners at the Cattlemen's BBQ.

I cannot begin to thank the ladies in our unit enough for all of their time. effort, and devotion in order to promote beef and get our message out into the classrooms and to the public! They are our natural resources and without them, it couldn't be done!!!!

Annual Activity Summary

Each month of the year the San Benito County CattleWomen support the **Red Cross** as they hold their monthly blood donations. Margaret Prewett and Sharon Hawkins are on-hand to provide warm **beef broth** to donors and visit with folks about why beef is a great way to keep iron levels strong.

In mid-December our **Holiday Social and General Membership Meeting** was held at the home of Janet and Mitt French. New board members were installed for their two year terms by out-going President Jessica Brem who cleverly selected a pre-recorded musical selection to compliment the office or personality of each new board member. In the Holiday spirit our members contributed canned goods for our local **Community Pantry** and **two families were "adopted"** by the Unit to help provide financial support during the holiday season. The enjoyable evening ended with our traditional ornament exchange.

The New Year started-off with a **Board of Directors Retreat** to familiarize members about the unit and their responsibilities. Information reviewed included the CattleWomen's Creed, our annual operating budget, assignment of Standing Committee Chair positions, newly revised By-laws and Policy & Procedures and various forms. A light meal of homemade soup, bread and salad capped-off the evening.

CattleWomen Carolyn Renz and Martha Tobias provided an interactive presentation to the Farm Day students about the value of eating lean beef (ZIP = zinc, iron and protein) and the many uses of beef by-products utilized in our economy. The teachers and parents were listening and learning too.

Our Cattlemen's Association held their annual **Dinner Dance** the last Saturday of March. This sold-out event was a great time for neighbors to visit and enjoy a delicious steak dinner and dancing on into the evening. Our CattleWomen crew headed-up by Carolyn Renz **decorated the dining tables** to help make the evening shine.

April was a very busy month for our Unit. Our **Spring General Membership Meeting** was held in conjuction with our very popular **Heritage Night.** This year's presentation by Diane Rianda Barr shared the history of Rural Post Offices. The presentation was followed with a top-notch Rib Eye Steak dinner with all the trimmings. Janet French and her posse always do a great job with this event. Charlotte (Punky) Tranberg was the lucky winner of the GIANT gift basket donated as a door prize.

Our local **YMCA** sponsor a **Healthy Kids Day** every April. Kim DuPont, Cheryl Holiday and Sandy Williams hosted the joint Cattlewomen and Cattlemens' tent. Participants had to toss bean bags through the "target cow" to win their prize of Gummy Bears (beef by-product) and "I love Beef" tattoos and stickers. Some of the many examples of beef-by- products were on display as a fun way to educate the general public. Brochures about nutrition and beef preparation and recipes were also made available.

A local non-profit organization called **San Benito Leadership** received support from both the CattleWomen and Cattlemen in April. This year, this organization had 14 students who are being educated about all aspects of San Benito County economy. Sandy Rose spoke about operating a beef cattle business and why horses will always be needed. John Eade from our Cattlemen's Association contributed to the presentation. Sonya Lee provided the group with a lively demonstration of how a horse "works" cattle. The presentation and traditional branding meal (steaks, beans, bread and salad) were hosted at the home and arena of Jamii and Stan Pura. We received rave reviews from the participants who greatly enjoyed this ag- business orientation day.

As part of the **Ag in the Classroom** program organized by our local Farm Bureau, a workshop (Educational Ag Tourism) is held every year to educate teachers about agriculture in our County. The CattleWomen and Cattlemen sponsored a table at the luncheon which was held at the Paicines Ranch. We used that opportunity to visit with teachers about the business of ranching and that being good stewards of the land is critical for us to operate effectively. Participants at our table received several brochures about nutrition and recipes for







We have only 3 general meetings a year, with 3 board meetings preceding them because we are geographically a very large county. So our many activities are member/committee driven. We do a lot of beef promotion and Ag education throughout the year with our biggest fundraiser being our county fair sandwich booth and the November dinner auction.

Ag in the Classroom: We have two school districts, east and west of I-5, so there are two main teams of CattleWomen Ag educators who visit many of the schools in the county. We educated 1,984 students in classrooms, 353 at our Ag Awareness Day event in May, and several classrooms got a local ranch tour. June is also the time for Sonoma Marin Fair where we sponsor awards for best breeding beef project.


August
